
## 2021 Tips for Claiming the Qualified Rural Hospital Organization Expense ("QRHOE") Tax Credit using H&R Block

 On the Vehicle, Rural Hospital, and Other Miscellaneous and Business Credits screen, click the 'Add Credit' button


## Vehicle, Rural Hospital, and Other Miscellaneous and Business Credits

Click Add Credit to tell us about your other credits.

If you add one of these credits, you must e-file your Georgia return.




- On the Enter Credit Information screen, click the drop-down arrow in the Credit type box, and choose '136 - Qualified Rural Hospital Organization Expense Tax Credit'
- Click Next
- Note: H&R Block is requiring that all individuals claiming the rural hospital tax credit must upload a completed Form IT-QRHOE-TP2 ("TP2 Form") when they file their return with the state.




- Click here to download and complete the fields of the TP2 Form.
- Click here to view an example of what a completed TP2 Form should look like.

- On the Business Credit
   Details screen, fill in each
   field, referencing Form IT QRHOE-RHO1 ("RHO1
   Form") that was emailed to
   you from Georgia HEART
- If you made more than one QRHOE tax credit contribution in 2021, click the 'Add Business' button to enter the additional contribution. The software will total the amounts once you click 'Next'

- You will now see your credit listed
- Click 'Next' to complete the process



- Note: If you did not reach the \$10,000 maximum in SALT (state and local) tax deductions, you may deduct your rural hospital contribution (up to that \$10,000 SALT cap).
  - In this situation, please see these <u>H&R Block instructions</u> for taking a deduction for your rural hospital contribution as "additional state income taxes paid."
